But learning to express your dog's bladder just takes time and patience. Others lose control permanently due to disease or aging. Whatever the case may be, take the time to develop your own technique with your dog. What seemed like an insurmountable problem can become just a routine part of the day. Try to be calm! Soon, both you and your dog will have figured this out together. If not, move to a slightly different area on the bladder and try again. When urine decreases to a dribble, the bladder has been sufficiently expressed. It is often a great relief. Rest your thumbs lightly on the dog's back. Do NOT put pressure directly on an injured spine, especially if the dog has disk disease. Reach under the dog to place your hands on the waist in front of the thighs. When you locate it, squeeze your hands together to begin expressing. This piece of equipment works very well as an expressing station. One pet owner created an expressing station on her back porch using a small metal hook, a clothes line, and small pulleys to hook up the line. A clip was attached to one end of the line to clip into a dog's walking harness. Step on the line to hold it steady. On the bar, he put nails at several locations to later fix the sling handles and adjust the height of the sling that holds the abdomen of the dog. Once there, extend the bar through the two handles of the sling. Then rest the bar on one step of the ladder at one side, and then to the other side of the ladder. Adjust the sling height using the nails placed at different positions on the bar. Then, let go of the sling and allow it to hold the dog. The whole process takes only five minutes or so to accomplish, once you get the hang of it. And with the help of the expressing station, one person can do easily this alone. Then, use the open face of the fist thumbs pointing forward or knuckle to knuckle thumbs pointing toward vourself when

Using the whole fist allows you to use more pressure spread over a larger area than just the fingertips. You can only feel the bladder when it is not abnormally distended. Find the spot that works for your dog, and repeat the actions numerous times each session. It may be useful on a shortterm or emergency basis. It involves external stimulation of the pet's genital area to encourage urination, as a mother cat does with tiny kittens. External stimulation may cause the pet to wet on your hand, which does not happen with expressing. If you are in a situation where your pet's bladder needs to be emptied and you have not been shown how to express or catheterize your pet, this method may help temporarily until you can see a vet. This is called expressing the bladder. Your vet will show you how to do this and it is important that you follow your vets instructions carefully. Your pet's bladder needs to be completely emptied at least three times a day every 8 hours. Some injured animals dribble or leak urine during the day. Expressing will ensure the

They do not urinate unless the bladder gets so full it overflows. Expressing will ensure urine does not stay in the bladder too long and create an environment where germs can grow. Expressing also keeps the bladder from stretching out. If the bladder becomes stretched, the pet may be unable to urinate normally even after the ability to control the bladder returns. A bladder infection can cause death in a few days if not treated. Bladder care is essential for the health of your pet, whether it has had surgery or not and whether it is completely or partially disabled. Here are the most common signs of urinary tract infection Preventive medical treatment will help you avoid infections. Work with your veterinarian in prescribing the best medication, checking pH, culturing the urine, and teaching you how to express your pet. Urine left in the bladder can become a place where bacteria breeds. The bladder must be manually expressed until your pet is able to fully urinate on its own. Having the bladder expressed at least three times a day is a permanent nursing care need for permanently impaired pets. The success of your nursing care program will depend on how effective you become in this care. This page describes how to express a bladder. This becomes so easy for you and your pet after a very short time. Small Dog Support the animal in an upright position. Locate the bladder. Gently do test squeezes on different spots until you identify it, starting where the ribs end and moving back. Your thumb should be on one side of the abdomen and your fingers on the other side. Gently squeeze your thumb and fingers together and see if urine is released. If not, move to a slightly different area on the bladder and try again. This is the right spot. The animal may lift its tail when the right spot is squeezed. Urine should be released in a fairly steady stream. When urine decreases to a dribble, the bladder has been sufficiently expressed. This is not painful for the pet.

It is often a great relief. Medium or Large Dog Place your hands on the pet's sides behind the rib cage. Here the thumbs are resting lightly on the back. Apply pressure squeezing inward and upward. Do not put pressure directly on an injured spine, especially if the dog has disk disease. If your hands become tired, pause to rest, then begin again. As the bladder shrinks you may need to stop and move your hands to a better position. Continue expressing until the bladder is empty. Cupping one hand This is how I would do it. Stand or kneel behind Riley and gently feel for his bladder. It should be about the size of an orange or small grapefruit. You want to cup it in one hand while gently pressing in and down on the opposite side. You need to control the location of the bladder with your cupping hand, trying to keep the pressure centered. Keep the pressure enough so the urine comes in a good flow. As the bladder gets smaller you will need to flatten out your cupping hand and press with it to get the rest out. I found that closing my eyes, helped because I could imagine what I was doing, since I couldnt actually see it. If you lose it, dont panic. Try again. if Riley resists, give Riley a few minutes to settle down and his bladder reposition itself. Then start again. We found that 3x4x a day for a beagle was about right. A pet owner can learn to express their dog's bladder in the home environment. First you should get a demonstration at a vet's clinic. The best way is for the vet or vet tech to put their hands over yours and guide you to the location of the bladder and to show you the appropriate amount of pressure to apply.

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They will also have experience as to whether or not your dog is a good candidate for the procedure based on the cause of the condition, the breed, the gender, size and the temperament of your dog. There are different methods to express the bladder based on those traits and conditions. A dog may be expressed while standing up, lying down, held in your arms or over a toilet. You may use one hand, two hands or just fingers. You may decide to express your dog inside or outside. Your vet's

clinic is the place to learn the techniques needed, for your dog, in order to achieve the best results. Trial and error is another aspect of this process. The size and shape depend on how much urine it is holding. It is located in the abdomen directly under the dog's hind legs. In the male, the bladder is above the middle of the dog's penis. In a female, it is a little more towards the dog's rear end. The bladder is not exactly in the same place every time. It depends on how full it is and what is in the GI tract. This will help with cooperation or learned responsejust like puppy potty training Keep to the routine. Figure out a place to do it and a pattern. Dogs are happier with routines. It is important to remain calm while you express. Tense and anxious makes for a tense and anxious dog who may tense up its stomach muscles making it harder to express. You may gently massage your dog's stomach. Remember to breathe. Remember! You can learn to do this with patience and practice. Use your fingers to locate the bladder. Search for what feels like a full balloon that is limed shaped. Remember what you actually feel and where depends on how full the bladder is. To express the bladder itself, you can use your finger tips or your fingers curled up. Slowly apply steady pressure until you get a steady stream of urine. Keep applying pressure until the urine slows to a dribble or stops and you can almost feel your fingers from each hand touching each other.

Wait up to thirty seconds to let the bladder reform and reshape which it will do, and then try again to express again to get the remaining urine out. Getting the last of the urine out will help reduce the chance of your dog developing a urinary tract infection. YOUR dog will determine the specifics. The usual recommendation is to express at least every six hours. Each dog is different in bladder capability to hold urine. With the bladder, you have to empty it often or the dog will become poisoned by its urine. Urine will not come out by itself; it will only overflow what the bladder CANNOT contain as more urine flows into the bladder from the kidneys. The rest stays put. Thats one reason why disabled dogs are so prone to urinary tract infections. The poop is really different from the pee. The poop will come out on its own, without your helping, eventually. Securely fasten the nails or screws along the areas where the handles hang off the bar. You will want to be able to move the handles further apart to raise your dogs rear end up, so each nail should be a few inches apart, so that the height can be adjusted gradually. You will want to hook the handles on the nails on the bar, beginning at the positions that are closest together. Put the handles at different positions on the bar, moving one side at a time, one nail at a time, until the dogs rear end is supported by the sling. When positioned correctly, the dogs rear end should be supported but not so high that their back feet are more than a few inches off the ground.

Use one arm to hold the dog up while you use the other to move the sling handles. The sling should be positioned so that the bladder is right behind the sling area and hence easy to locate and express. Hollering, growling, and whimpering are bad signs. It's important not to let the bladder become so full that it's overstretched, as this can cause it some long term damage. Always give your dog a good chance to pee naturally first carry him to a suitable patch of ground outside, and let him walk on a lead for up to a few minutes, with support from a hindquarter sling if needed. To express the bladder, Start with your dog positioned on a nonslip surface in a supported standing position. Most people find it easier to use two hands to express their dog's bladder to start with, so have someone else there to distract him from in front. Place a hand on each side of your dog's belly, and use the flat parts of your hands to apply slow, steady pressure to empty the bladder. Avoid digging your fingertips in, or trying to overpower your dog. For a demonstration, try this link. In which case take your hands off, let your dog relax for a moment, then try again. If you still can't express your dog's bladder, then ask your vet what to do. Your dog might need medication to make it easier for the bladder to empty. Or your vet may need to pass a catheter into the bladder so as to empty it. In the early stages, it's sometimes necessary to admit the dog to the hospital and have a catheter kept in place for a few days an indwelling catheter. Expressing the bladder outdoors will help your dog to associate peeing with being outdoors, thus helping him return to normal function more easily. Do not dangle your dog over a drain, toilet or sink while expressing his bladder.

A dangling position leaves him feeling helpless, may be unsafe for his spine, and it teaches him nothing about how to learn to pee again. This may take days, weeks or even months, but it's important to help your dog learn. Set him up for success by doing the bladder expression with your dog supported in a standing position, ideally on a suitable patch of ground outdoors. If they still have control over their bladder, this is not necessary. Your regular vet can show you how to do this. We will provide a few links below as well with instructions. The reason it is important to learn to express the bladder if your dog can not control their bladder muscles is to help them to completely empty their bladder. Not only does this help prevent accidents, but it also helps clear out the bladder to help minimize the risk for bladder and urinary tract infections. Remember the bladder, kidneys and urinary tract are all part of the system that eliminates waste. If the waste sits too long it can cause an infection. Nature does work its course and what goes in does go out, but if a urinary tract infection UTI is not treated quickly and properly it can continue to get worse. It is important that your vet cultures the urine sample if the urine smells a little funky, or strong, or is deep yellow, orange or even red and looks like blood. By culturing the urine sample they should prescribe the proper antibiotic. Some vets dont do this and the UTI comes back and is usually more fierce. It can settle in the bladder too and get deep into the tissue. The right antibiotics are key for this.

Even if you see what looks like pure blood coming out it can be treated, so dont get scared, just make sure you get your dog to the vet. If you are not comfortable with your own vet, or are afraid someone is going to suggest putting them down because of the UTI make an appointment with a veterinary specialist who focuses on Internal medicine they will know exactly what to do to help. UTIs are very common with paralyzed dogs, so be aware that youll probably see this happen at some point, and its relatively easy to fix or control once you get it properly cultured, and treated. You also can work with a holistic vet who is trained in food therapy and herbs, on top of regular veterinary medicine, and they can help you alter the body chemistry of your dog through diet to make it inhospitable to bladder infections and urinary tract infections. Its not a broken back or anything, so there is a possibility of her regaining feeling and already has slightly but our most pressing concern is getting her to urinate. When we were at the vet yesterday, he was unable to manually express her bladder, and due to her size could not catheterize her. Eventually he pulled the urine out with a needle, but thats a slow process and we cant go to the vet every day just to get her to pee. Were gonna go again later tonight and try and figure a solution out, but I was wondering if any of the dog owners of reddit have faced a similar situation and could give us ideas our vet hasnt thought of. We tried manual expression again today both in the shower and outside where she normally pees, thinking she would be more comfortable but have had no results. The bladder is obviously full, and we dont want to cause her any more damage so weve severely limited her water. Ive read that she will not have a problem pooping when she needs to, but weve avoided giving her a lot of food so she doesnt get too thirsty so far. It cant hurt to fill a small tub with some warm water, gently place her in it, and help her stay still for a bit. Shes resting now, but were gonna try it in about an hour. Ill update if it works.

We tried manual expression after about 5 minutes of soaking and her bladder is no longer distended. Were not sure when she released, in the bucket on her own or with manual pressure, because we cant find the pee, but whatever did it it worked. Id still be happy to hear any other suggestions. She didnt really like the bath and while shes on antiinflammatory steroids shes gonna be drinking a lot and peeing a lot. Our problem and the vets is that it simply doesnt work. Her sphincter is too tightly clenched and urine wont pass through. She did start getting a little feeling back last night though. She started howling around bedtime this dog never makes a peep and we could not figure out what was going on. She kept squirming when we picked her up. We took her outside on our patio and she kept squirming and pointing until I sort of assistedwalked her to her normal pee spot and she went on her own. Still waiting to see if this is a onetime thing or if she has regained sensation down there. Incontinent animals may leave a pool of urine where they have been lying or may dribble urine while walking. The coat around the vulva or prepuce may be wet, and perivulvar or peripreputial dermatitis can result from urine scalding. Urge incontinence is seen with detrusor irritability, usually associated with cystitis. The most common nonneurogenic incontinence is attributed to deficiency of sex hormones in neutered animals, particularly female dogs, and is referred to as hormonalresponsive urethral incompetence. Idiopathic urethral sphincter incompetence also is seen.
