# Domestic Violence Advocate Training Manual

These resources include guidance for domestic violence prevention in immigrant communities and for providing effective services to immigrant survivors who experience domestic violence. Information about legal options and public benefits is also included but since these periodically change, they may be dated. Please consult the organizations listed at the end of this special collection to verify the accuracy of the available information. It offers a detailed description of the advocate's role during the criminal justice process, with particular focus on their involvement during forensic exams or interviews. Next, the article addresses the fact that many law enforcement officers, forensic examiners, and other community professionals are reluctant to involve advocates in the process, so we address some of the common factors underlying this reluctance and offer strategies to resolve them. It was then subsequently published in Sexual Assault Report, Vol. 11, No. 6, pp. 8182, 8695 by the Civic Research Institute. This module offers detailed guidance on the role of communitybased and systembased victim advocates, specifically for work that intersects with the criminal justice system. Although the name of the patient might not be revealed when an advocate is called out to respond, some have interpreted the face to face contact that may be made as violating HIPAA. It contains information to help advocates understand the basic housing rights of domestic violence survivors and provides guidance to help survivors exercise these rights. This information will be most useful to newer advocates or advocates that have had limited experience providing housing support. Includes chapters on the National Housing Trust Fund, special housing issues including housing needs of survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, dating violence and stalking, and information on tools and types of housing programs. The Guide includes an orientation to affordable housing and community development programs, explains how affordable housing works and why it is needed, and provides vital information to guide organizations and individuals in their advocacy efforts. Also includes information about the core affordable housing programs and policies that make housing and community development programs work on the ground. This is true for both sexual violence perpetration and victimization. Oppression can both heighten risk and compound the barriers that sexual violence victims and survivors encounter in housing arenas. This guide is intended to equip advocates with information and resources to support their housing advocacy efforts. Information on housing as both a sexual violence prevention and intervention advocacy area is explored. Efforts to help survivors find housing are crucial, as housing instability is a major obstacle for survivors who are seeking to end abusive relationships or to avoid returning to their abusers. The manual provides background information and sample documents that can be used to advocate on behalf of survivors who are seeking housing. The goal of this Manual is to make housing issues more accessible and easily understandable to advocates, regardless of their prior knowledge of housing law. Includes a section on housing and employment barriers.

It attempts to recognize the unique experience of antiviolence workers and to promote individual, professional and organizational solutions to support them. Vicarious trauma is one outcome of antiviolence work; its effects cumulative and build upon memories obtained through listening to the stories of one inhumane act of cruelty after another. Understanding and working with the trauma is both an individual and organizational challenge. The excerpted chapter describes how advocates and programs can support survivors seeking safety, sobriety, wellness, autonomy and justice by reducing service barriers and ending isolation for people impacted by multiple abuse issues. Policies and procedures to ensure culturally competent, appropriate, nonpunitive and nonjudgmental accessible services are key. The goals of the Housing Toolbox are to lead to greater collective work locally and to present strategies that can be replicated and scaled into any community. The interagency collaboration established this domestic violence and housing technical assistance consortium to provide national domestic violence and housing training and resource development. Advocates can decide whether or not a survivor receives services within their agency, and by the very nature of their jobs, advocates possess connections and resources that survivors may not otherwise have access to. Therefore, a trauma-informed agency must work to reduce this power imbalance by empowering survivors to direct their own shelter experiences and lead their own healing journeys. Throughout this manual, you will find examples of evidence-based best practices that take into account power differentials between staff and residents and seek to reduce the risk of retraumatization.

implementation, and additional resources. Agencies may go section by section and use the included checklists, activities, conversation starters, and other tools to lead discussions during supervision, staff meetings, and for staff training and personal development. Supporting Crime Victims With Disabilities, a new training curriculum, focuses on recognizing and addressing these challenges so that all victims with disabilities receive the support and assistance they need. This guide seeks to increase avenues for partnership and collaboration between these three types of services, recognizing that people often face cooccurring issues. This section includes resources to help advocates apply these fundamental concepts to specific challenges and considerations for victims. It begins with evidence for three common core components of this work mobile advocacy, flexible funding, and attending to safety. It then provides evidence for how services should be provided survivor-driven, trauma-informed, and voluntary. It is difficult for male survivors to discuss the matter in public because of social stigma. But special reporting centres and courts in South Africa are improving things. The country has set up Thuthuzela Centres which are named after a Xhosa word meaning comfort. The centres aim to create a safe, empathetic and comfortable environment where people who have been raped can get all the medical and legal care they need in one place.

Victim Assistance Training Online has four sections Basics, Core Competencies and Skills, Crimes, and Specific Considerations for Providing Victim Services. Developed in partnership by the U.S. Department of Justice's Office for Victims of Crime OVC and Bureau of Justice Assistance BJA, this Guide is a resource to support established task forces and provide guidance to agencies that are forming task forces. Its purpose is to assist in the development and day to day operations of an antihuman trafficking task force and to provide fundamental guidance for effective task force operations. A panel of experts shares their experiences working with elderly victims and advice for those hoping to serve elderly victims better. The purpose of the training is to strengthen awareness of polyvictimization in later life and to provide knowledge and skills of professionals to address the needs of victims. The training addresses the context of polyvictimization; victims and perpetrators of polyvictimization; best practices to work with older adults affected by polyvictimization using trauma-informed, ethical, and culturally appropriate practices; and the latest research and best practices to serve this population. Also included are tip sheets on working with teen survivors, information on confidentiality and mandated reporting laws, information on the teen brain, an annotated bibliography of recent research, and more. It has three aims a to provide an overview for the intersections between identity, trauma experiences, and resiliency among youth who are homeless; b to highlight core skills and techniques for advocates; and c to discuss how to tailor these skills in order to improve services for youth who identify as LGBTQ. Using core principles and strategies, the guide helps frame an approach that is aimed at enhancing parenting capacities and strengthening parent-child bonds. Most are poor, and a disproportionate number are women of color, both immigrant and U.S. born.

In court, this person is usually the defendant, or the person accused of a crime. The survivor is usually the plaintiff, or the person who is accusing the defendant of a crime. PEOPLE OF COLOR POC An umbrella term used primarily in the United States to describe any person who is not white. The term encompasses all nonwhite people, emphasizing common experiences of systemic racism. PRONOUNS Linguistic tools used to refer to someone in the third person. In English and some other languages, pronouns have been tied to gender and are a common site of misgendering attributing a gender to someone that is incorrect. QUEER An umbrella term to describe individuals who don't identify as straight. Also used to describe people who have nonnormative gender identity or as a political affiliation.

Penetration may be of the survivor or forcing the survivor to penetrate the actor; penetration can be accomplished with either a body part or other object. Similarly, contact can be sexual contact with the survivor or forcing a survivor to touch the actor. SEXUAL HARASSMENT Unwanted verbal sexual advances, requests for sexual favors and other visual, verbal, or physical conduct of a sexual nature. Can occur in the workplace, school, and other settings such as public transportation, shopping malls, community events, social gatherings, places of worship, health care facilities and can create an intimidating or hostile environment for the survivor. The perception of the survivor, not the intent of the harasser, determines whether particular words or actions are harassing. The order can require the person who harmed you to stay away from you, your home, school, work or other places you request, and to have no further contact with you. STALKING A pattern of conduct that places a person in fear for their safety, including behaviors or acts used by a person to harass, threaten, or intimidate another. SURVIVOR A person being abused—physically, verbally, sexually or in another harmful manner—is referred to as a survivor. UVISA Type of Visa granted to a victim of criminal activity. Victims must have suffered substantial mental or physical abuse due to the criminal activity and possess information concerning that criminal activity. Law enforcement authorities must also certify that the victim has been, is being, or is likely to be helpful in the investigation or prosecution of the criminal activity. VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN ACT VAWA A landmark piece of legislation that sought to improve criminal justice and communitybased responses to domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking in the United States. The passage of VAWA in 1994 and its reauthorization in 2000, 2005, and 2013, has changed the landscape for victims who once suffered in silence.

ANTI HARASSMENT ORDER AHO A civil order that asks the court to grant a "stayaway" order against someone unreasonably interfering with your privacy or creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive living environment for you. DATING VIOLENCE Abuse that happens between two people who are dating and is typically used when discussing abusive teenage relationships. DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS DOC Made up of dedicated professionals who work hard to improve public safety. Employees work in a variety of specialties and programs to administer a comprehensive system of corrections for convicted law violators in the state of Washington RCW.72.09.010. DOMESTIC VIOLENCE HIGH RISK TEAM DVHRT A multidisciplinary model designed to enhance our community's response to intimate partner violence cases that pose the greatest risk of escalating to lethal or nearlethal assault. The purpose of the DVHRT is to facilitate early identification of the most dangerous DV offenders, establish clear channels of communication across disciplines, and provide a coordinated community response. DOMESTIC VIOLENCE PROTECTION ORDER DVPO A

civil order from the court telling the family or household member who threatened or assaulted you not to harm you again. **EMOTIONAL ABUSE** Using a survivor's emotions or manipulating their mental state in order to gain control—attacking someone's self-esteem, using insults, humiliation, or attempting to convince the survivor he or she is mentally unstable or to blame for the abuse. This can also be known as verbal or psychological abuse. **EQUITY** Trying to understand where people are coming from and give them what they need to be successful. This means not necessarily giving everyone the exact same thing as in equality, but rather just what they need to live happily. **INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE IPV** Another term for domestic violence, sometimes also referred to as domestic abuse.

While domestic violence typically refers to abuse happening between two people in a relationship, including a spouse and partner, parent and child, siblings, etc., intimate partner violence refers more specifically to abuse by a spouse or exspouse, or a dating partner or exdating partner. Intimate partner violence does not require sexual intimacy in order to occur. **LETHALITY ASSESSMENT PROGRAM LAP** Based on the pioneering research of Dr. Jacquelyn Campbell, the LAP is used to identify survivors of intimate partner violence who are in highest danger of being killed by their intimate partners. Once a HighDanger survivor has been identified, the first responder immediately connects the survivor via a hotline call to the local domestic violence service program for emergency safety planning and enhanced service provision. The plus is included to be inclusive of all identities that may fall under the queer see below umbrella. **OFFICE ON VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN OVW** Provides federal leadership in developing the national capacity to reduce violence against women and administer justice for and strengthen services to victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking. The OVW is a primary funding source for many domestic violence and sexual assault programs throughout the country.
